


Image in Text w/ InDesign 2.0

After placing your image on the page with picture placer, follow these steps for placing photo into type.

1. Type **Headline** in font and point size. The font used for this example is AYT Knockout at 102pt.

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2. Select text with your black selection arrow and go to the Type menu at the top to Create Outlines. This will turn your text into a graphic.



3. While your text is still selected with your black arrow, change your fill to none and your stroke to 1 pt. To change the fill, go to the Window menu at the top and check Swatches. Select your text and then select none in your swatch window. To change the point size, go to the Window menu to Stroke and change to 1 pt. This can actually be any size and color you would like. This effect can also work on B/W pages.

4. Select your picture that you have already placed with picture placer using your direct selection tool (white arrow). Then go to the Edit menu at the top to Copy. The next step is to select your text that you have already converted with your white arrow and then go to the Edit menu to Place Into. The picture will then appear inside the text. To move the image around inside the text, the direct selection tool (white arrow) must be used to select the photo and then drag it into position. After you have the image where you need it, delete your picture placed image with your black arrow.

This is a great idea for eye-catching headlines and to bring more color onto a page. You could also do one letter at a time and use a different photo for each letter. To do this correctly, the photos would need to be sized proportionately before you begin.

Note: It is very important to pay attention to the color of your arrows to ensure that your page will gather correctly.
